With the water constantly moving, waves can seem like a daunting subject to attempt to capture in our sketchbooks. By breaking down the shape of the wave, the values needed to make a wave like 3D on the paper and then adding in a limited color palette, the process becomes so much easier and a whole lot of fun! In this class, we'll be working with a "junk journal," grayscale images and limited color mixing to create our waves. The class will not be about creating a finished page so much is a workshop on HOW to create waves on the page.

ANATOMY OF A WAVE

SUPPLY LIST



- 5.5" x 8.5," 7" x 7" or 7" x 10" Watercolor Sketchbook (For someone just getting started I recommend Canson Montval Watercolor Spiral Bound Pad, 5.5" x 8.5")*

- Tracing Paper
- Mechanical Pencil
- White Uni-ball® Signo Pen*

*Be Sure To Have This (available at Keeton's)

- Kneaded Eraser and White Eraser
- Small/Fine and Large/Broad Tipped Permanent Black Pen (I recommend Faber-Castell PITT pens)
- #7 or 8 round brush OR a Large waterbrush
- Small #2 or 4 round brush OR a Small waterbrush
- Watercolors - A small set like Cotman or Winsor and Newton work well. Paint should be out on a palette and ready to go rather than in tubes.

**It will be important to have at least two blue pigments for this class as we will be creating a variety of color mixes from these two colors. If you have more than two, consider bringing them with you.

- Facial Tissues

Optional Supplies

Permanent Ink Markers in Blues and blue-grays
White Sharpie® Poster Paint Pen in a Fine Tip

Pen Recommendations:

Faber Castell® Pitt® Pens, Pigma® Micron® and Prismacolor all make a widerange of permanent colored markers. Be very careful of using Sharpie® markers as they can bleed through your paper months after you use them.
